Ewing Tartan Cloth / Ready-Made Garments

The Ewing tartan, woven by Lochcarron of Scotland is exquisitely made, and several EFA members have purchased these beautiful pieces. It is unique and distinctive, reflecting our history and tradition. You can order cloth or readymade garments by email from tartans@clanewing.uk.

Currently, all garments are made in 13oz Medium Weight 'Braeriach' tartan fabric; the pattern repeats every 6 1/4 inches or slightly more. All prices below are listed in Pounds Sterling (GBP) and subject to change. – Please check the current exchange rate to convert to other currencies.

Cloth @ £49/metre (£45/yard)

NB because the cloth is woven to double width, the amount needed for an 8 yard kilt is usually equivalent to 4 yards (3.7m). Be sure to ask your kilt maker before placing your order.

<u>Update January 2016</u> -- There has been a minor setback on the tartan front in that production has been delayed due to a mix up over the Christmas period. Thor has had a few enquiries by email, and will let you know when we'll be back up and running as soon as we have something more definitive to say. As well as replenishing the medium-weight Braeriach, he has also asked for a light-weight Reiver tartan, which will probably be woven with slightly a smaller sett pattern than the Braeriach. Light-weight tartan is sometimes preferred for skirts, sashes and ties.

A Word from the Commander

Dear Clansfolk and Cousins,

This year, 2016, is the 450th anniversary of the earliest known grant of arms in the Ewing name. The Treasurer's Accounts of Mary Queen of Scots list 'William Ewin' as the recipient of a Letter of Summons in September 1566. His arms were probably awarded when he came to court later that year, and his shield is recorded in the Workman Armorial. By this, William became Chief of the Name and Arms of Ewing and, since Ewing is a Highland name, he is also considered Chief of the Clan. Although this wasn't the foundation of our clan (for which we'd have to look back as far as the original Ewen in the 1200's) but it was official recognition that we still existed as a clan and, as such, it may be seen as something like a renewal of vows.

In addition it's the year of our third Clan tent, at the EFA Gathering at the Saline Celtic Festival in Michigan.

I'm also arranging a small Scottish gathering - plans are currently being finalised, but it is expected to be at Strathleven House later in the year. Details will be posted shortly at www.clanewing.uk/2016. Although there have been regular gatherings of American Ewings for many years, there has so far been no equivalent for Ewings in Britain and Ireland. I hope this will draw more attention to the existence of Clan Ewing over on this side of the Atlantic.
