Additional Sites of Interest in Fort Wayne

On Friday, September 22, participants in *Making Connections*, the Ninth Biennial Gathering of Clan Ewing, will be transported from historic Lindenwood Cemetery to downtown Fort Wayne, Indiana, for a luncheon at the History Center. Although buses will begin returning people to Don Hall's Guesthouse shortly after lunch, there are three excellent possibilities for your afternoon adventure.

The first is the Allen County Public Library, home to one of the most extensive genealogy collections in the United States. Our breakfast speaker on Friday morning will be ACPL staff genealogist Steve Meyer, who will give us pointers on how to use the library. On Friday afternoon ACPL staff and volunteers from the Allen County Genealogical Society will be on hand in the ACPL Genealogy Department to give assistance to anyone who wishes to research.

There are two other exceptional sites in the immediate vicinity. One is the Allen County Court House and the other is the Lincoln Museum. The Court House is an imposing Beaux Art structure dedicated in 1902. It is a National Historic Landmark (NHL), one of only 35 in the state of Indiana. The exterior is blue Bedford limestone and Vermont granite. Atop the copper-sheathed dome is a 14-foot tall copper Liberty. The interior has undergone a \$9 million restoration, including a clean up of its four magnificent murals by artist Charles Holloway. It is a wonderful building to visit.

The other attraction of note is The Lincoln Museum. This museum holds the world's largest private collection dedicated to the life and times of Abraham Lincoln. It includes signed copies of the Emancipation Proclamation and the 13th Amendment as well as Lincoln family belongings and more than 300 original Lincoln documents. It houses a research library and a museum store. The Lincoln Museum is adjacent to the Allen County Public Library, making it very accessible to all who may be interested in Civil War era history and the Lincoln family in particular.

You will have several hours to spend before returning to the Guesthouse, or you may choose to stay downtown until the last trolley at 6:00 p.m. Be prepared to be delighted with Fort Wayne and all she has to offer.
